Suzanne loved working with children. For many years she worked at Liberty High School as an Instructional Assistant working with children with special needs. She thrived while working there and saw many of her kids grow and achieve as they should. Suzanne will always be remembered for her love and kindness to everyone. She was the best mother any of her children or foster children could ever ask for. She was devoted to providing them with the love and support they needed. Suzanne lived a long fruitful life until William's passing. Sadly, in her final years she suffered from the loss of her best friend and husband, the loss of her sight due to macular degeneration, and the loss of her wonderful personality due to dementia.
